Our Environmental Health Team has been busy conducting weekly public beach water testing, in addition to their regular inspections, permit distribution, etc, within towns that fall under our jurisdiction.

Our Community Health Team has been busy getting ready for the upcoming Flu Vaccination season and has been coordinating with town officials, schools, and senior centers to compose a Flu Vaccination Clinic schedule. It is also important to note that our COVID-19 Vaccination and Rapid PCR Testing schedule has changed for the summer. You can find the updated summer schedule by visiting https://hvhd.us/covid-19/.

COVID-19 UPDATE

During this reporting period (June 10 - July 12, 2022):

- The Connecticut State Department of Public Health significantly changed its reporting of COVID-19 data and the pared down datasets are made available each Thursday.
- Following a thorough discussion on June 28, 2022, an overwhelming majority of the FDA advisory committee voted in favor of including a SARS-CoV-2 omicron component in COVID-19 vaccines that would be used for boosters in the U.S. beginning in fall 2022. The FDA panel has cautioned that their recommendation doesn't necessarily mean everyone would get a tweaked booster they might be urged only for older adults or those at high risk from the virus.
- On June 19, 2022, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) ACIP recommended COVID-19 vaccines for children ages 6 months to 5 years. Federal regulators now have authorized the Moderna vaccine for children ages 6 months through 5 years, and the Pfizer vaccine for children ages 6 months through 4 years.
- On June 15, 2022, an expert U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) panel voted that the Pfizer and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective for children ages 6 months and older. The FDA's panel voted unanimously—21-0—that the benefits of Moderna's vaccine outweigh its risks for kids ages 6 months through 5 years of age. They also voted unanimously that the benefits of Pfizer's vaccine outweigh risks for kids ages 6 months through 4 years.



CONFERENCES/TRAININGS

During this reporting period (June 10 - July 12, 2022):

- The PHEP/MRC Coordinator, Community Health Nursing Supervisor, and the Director of Health attended the QPR Training of Trainers on June 28th.
- The PHEP/MRC Coordinator and the Community Health Nursing Supervisor prepared to present their findings at the NACCHO Conference in Atlanta, GA from July 18 - July 21st.





COMMUNITY HEALTH REPORT

The Community Health Division is continually building relationships with community members to serve as an educational resource for residents, businesses, schools, and other stakeholders.

During this reporting period, the Community Health Division completed the following:

- Worked with community stakeholders, our Public Health Communications Coordinator, and Community Health team members to create a flu and COVID-19 vaccination clinic schedule for the Fall.
- Onboarded a new intern
- Began interviewing clinical personnel to support upcoming vaccination clinics
- Prepared presentation about the "Coping During Times of COVID-19" grant-funded program for the NACCHO conference from July 18 - 21 in Atlanta, GA
- Participated in the Narcan trainer program and earned certification
- Participated in the QPAR trainer certification class
- Implemented additional Senior Center educational programs
- Conducted a med administration class for a daycare center
- Collaborated on the COVID-19 After Action Report with the Public Health Communication Coordinator and the PHEP/MRC Coordinator





Public Health Preparedness and Medical Reserve Corp (MRC) Report:

The Public Health Emergency Preparedness Division aims to build community relationships and prepare our communities to deal with emergency situations. The Division serves as an educational resource for personal and community preparedness through community building and volunteer recruitment.

During this reporting period, the PHEP/MRC Division:

- Working on securing more blood drive locations for the towns served
- Assisting with the regional PHEP coordinator on Region 5 POD plans and other PHERP annexes to make plans throughout our region universal
- Met with Red Cross to make introductions and see the services they provide that can improve our preparedness services
- Met with Americorps to make introductions and collaborate on different capabilities our organizations can provide each other
- Received certification for training Opioid Overdose and NARCAN use. This will be used to help teach volunteers and to spread the knowledge in our community.
- Received certification to be a QPR Suidice Prevention Instructor. This will also be used to help teach volunteers and community members to be able to use the knowledge in real-world events
- Assisting in the Global Local Health Exchange Program with our Community Health team to help coordinate volunteers and assist with any deliverables that need to be met
- Submitted all financial budgets to meet grant deliverables in a timely manner

- Compiled materials and composed the FY21-22 Annual Report




